Dear Friends

This Christmas as we gather in our churches we shall proclaim the coming of the 'Prince of Peace' as prophesied by the prophet Isaiah. Writing in November just before Remembrance Sunday, and also even more immediately this year with wars raging in Ukraine and Israel / Palestine – not to mention the perhaps equally tragic but forgotten conflicts elsewhere in the world – this acclamation seems perhaps more urgent and pertinent than in other years.

Yet we might also ask whether this is just a pious hope; after all we are celebrating the birth of Jesus over 2000 years ago, and yet there seems to be little progress towards that peaceable rule. It is worth noting that Jesus himself was not unrealistic about the prospects for peace amongst a world riddled with conflict. After all, he was himself violently assaulted and crucified by the plotting of various factions, Roman and Jewish, who though in many ways opposed, crudely calculated that both of their worlds would be easier if they were to rid themselves of this troublesome rabbi. Moreover, and perhaps somewhat contradictorily, Jesus himself said that he 'came not to bring peace but a sword.' It should be said that Jesus nor his disciples used violence, in fact even in the Yours extremis of his arrest Jesus tells Peter to put away his sword, and heals the person whom Peter has struck. Rather Jesus was

simply saying that though he and we might come in peace, realistically the world will respond with violence, indeed perhaps it is that very act of defiant



pacificism which will provoke a violent response.

I and many other Christians, are not fully pacificists, indeed Christian theologians first developed the doctrine of 'just war.' However, I do think that in most cases violence is not the answer, it makes things worse, and just makes the inevitable and final negotiations for peace more difficult. Tragically, of course, often a violent answer to a violent action is exactly what is expected and indeed desired. The extremists of Hamas indeed want to provoke a show down with the Israeli military. They have never wanted peace, and moreover for many of them their own violent death is of no consequence. Sometimes even in the face of the worst provocation, peaceful and stubborn refusal to play the game can be the most effective resistance to evil.

WOOLMER GREEN PARISH COUNCIL



The Welwyn Hatfield Local Plan was submitted for examination by a government appointed planning inspector in 2017 and has been the subject of many meetings, consultations and updates since then. The Parish Council, following feedback from the local community, has argued consistently that the two brownfield sites (the former Entech site now developed and occupied, and the car dealership) could deliver sufficient housing without resorting to building on the Green Belt. Concerns were raised with the additional Green Belt development regarding insufficient infrastructure, the road capacity and flooding risks.

Despite the many arguments raised, the planning inspector regarded the site as suitable and it was included in the **Local Plan** that was approved on 12th October 2023 by the Borough Council. For Woolmer Green this means that the Green Belt site and car dealership site are earmarked for another 184 homes. Plans for these sites will have to be submitted via the normal planning application process. The Parish

Council still opposes the development of the Green Belt for all the reasons above that have been argued over the past few years. The Chairman, Clerk and I met with Grant Shapps' constituency agent, Nat Chapman, at the end of October to discuss what support Grant and his team could provide to the Parish Council. The support offered by Grant and his team in this matter throughout the iterations of the plan has been appreciated and we continue to hope that the Green Belt site may be preserved.


REMEMBERING PETER LEE......

Peter Lee died on 10th September 2023 and a Service of Remembrance and Thanksgiving for Peter was held at St Mary's on 25th October. The Church was full, giving testament to the high regard and love in which Peter was held by his family and all his many friends.

Peter loved St Mary's and his connection with the Church goes back many years. Peter moved to Welwyn in 1950 with his parents, Jack and Marjorie, and his brother John. Jack and Marjorie were great supporters of St Mary's, Jack being a Churchwarden for some years. Peter and John went to St Mary's Primary School and spent much time in and around the Village, hanging over the stable door of Mr Dyer the village cobbler in Church Street on the way to and from school, making camps on Danesbury fields and trying to raft on the Mimram – idyllic and open days of youth as they were then. They were both in the choir and in 1952, saw from their home at The Chequers, the flames and smoke from the fire at St Mary's which so badly damaged the chancel.

After St Mary's school, the boys went to boarding school in Suffolk – a school with a strong emphasis on Christian values. Their connection to St Mary's and the village became restricted to school holidays. However, their parents volunteered them for jobs connected to St Mary's like cutting the Rector's lawn – these jobs were clearly unpaid chores but somewhat mitigated by the fact that the Rector of the day, Canon Bate, had four eye-catching daughters!!

Boarding schools in those days were spartan and character forming!! Peter flourished at school and moved on to become a King's Scholar at the King's



School, Ely. He flourished academically and in sport but also in terms of leadership. He was made head boy, chairman of a number of school societies and a cadet sergeant leading the Combined Cadet Force. Thus was nurtured so many of the leadership, organisational and inter-personal skills which we so associated with Peter in his later life.

Peter, following in the footsteps of his father, qualified as a chartered surveyor, auctioneer and estate agent. After gaining very practical experience with a number of companies, he joined WH Lee and developed and grew the commercial side of the business.

In the midst of a very busy and successful business life, Peter joined the Welwyn Round Table and the Welwyn Young Conservatives (seen as the marriage bureau of the day) and sure enough it worked. Peter was bowled over by Adrienne, firstly at a Burnham Green party and then appropriately at the Stevenage Bowling Centre!! It was love at first sight and Peter and Adrienne married in St Mary's in 1969, a very long, happy, loving and supporting relationship with sons Nick

and Simon, and the grandchildren.

Peter spent 31 years variously in Rotary, Round Table, 41 Club and Probus, always leading, organising and building friendships and fellowship. He became President of Rotary in 1993 and was also Chairman of the Stevenage Chamber of Commerce. Then there was his volunteering in the charitable works of these organisations. Visits to old folks' homes where Peter entertained with his conjuring tricks and the Romanian Project, which over 10 years gave compassionate and practical support to the children in those homes we all saw pictures of.

On the fun side, Peter organised bike rides to France, days out to Lords, the Oval, Twickenham, Steele-Bodgers at Cambridge, steam railway journeys, The Christmas Show at Thursford, and we remember Peter and Adrienne's very generous hospitality at their garden parties.

Peter loved his breakfasts (full English of course). We together ran the very successful St Mary's Men's Breakfast for many years, and Peter was a member of the Dot Breakfast Club and the Redcoats Club. He loved his lunches too, the End of Month Club, and the Commuters' Club. Then there was the Danesbury Investment Club, the friendship and social side of which we all enjoy so much — makes up for the investment side!!.

In retirement, Peter used his experience to help property-owning charities, including Herts Action for the Disabled and St John Ambulance and was made a member of the St John's Order – a signal honour. He was chairman of the Ayot Green Parish Council. All these organisations were very important to Peter and Peter was very important to

all of these organisations. In all that he did, Peter exuded friendship and I think that is why so many gathered at his Thanksgiving Service. He offered a very respectful, reliable and, it must be said, very generous friendship to all he knew.

At his Thanksgiving Service we gathered in the church, which Peter loved and to which he contributed so much:

- The beautiful Processional Cross which he gave in memory of his parents Jack and Majorie.
- The Church Office which Adrienne and Peter gave in memory of Simon.
- Church House which Peter and I worked together on with others and brought to fruition in 2007.
- Peter was Chairman of the Fabric Committee for 14 years, and the fine state of the St Mary's building is a tribute to his stewardship.

We gave thanks to God for the gift of Peter's life and thanks to Peter for living that life as he did – a full and very good life.

Peter of course lives on. He lives on in the hearts and minds of us all.

The choir sang the anthem 'The Lord Bless You and Keep You, the Lord make his face to shine upon you and give you his peace'.

BEYOND THE FARM GATE || Issue 9 Autumn/Winter 2023

Welcome back beyond the farm gate. As autumn draws on and winter approaches, it is time for arable farmers like me to take stock of the year that has passed, what is growing now, and what needs doing over the colder months.

Since my last article, all of our winter crops have been planted, including wheat and oats. We used a mixture of soil preparation methods this year to try and combat issues with black grass, a particularly problematic weed in British agriculture. On those fields worst affected, we ploughed to give the soil a fresh start and to disturb the roots of those weeds. In doing so, we hope to reduce the amount of herbicide needed to control the weeds, by quite literally removing the source of the problem. We also ploughed those parcels containing straw stubble. This is the remnants of the stems of our previous crops and acts as a great organic matter to fertilise our soil.

In those parcels less affected by weeds, we used a machine called a Sumo. It has 3 elements: 1: plough-like tines, 2: rotating serrated disks and, at the very back, 3: heavy rolls. The tractor pulls this machine along the field. As it does so, 3 processes occur at once; the tines plough up the ground, the disks cut through the large slabs of earth which have been ploughed up, and finally the rolls press and crumble these clods of earth onto a finer texture. The Sumo is ideal for creating a fine tilth and a perfect seed bed for next year's crop.

Having drilled our winter seed, we had

a few days of agony as the heavens opened. As much as we felt pleased to have finished our drilling before the rain (as our machinery was likely to get stuck), there is also a high risk of seeds drowning or, if the rain is heavy enough, being washed away. Time will tell whether or not the rain had a severe impact on our seeds, or indeed the cold snap we experienced in early October. That is the way of farming; when working with nature there is always an element of risk, especially with the increased extremities of the climate today.

As we head into winter, there is always more to do than meets the eye. While you may not see us out on the fields in the tractor, we are always busy no matter the season. At this time of year, we spend a lot of time preparing for future months, repairing that machine that we have postponed since harvest, fixing fences, or managing the woodland. As I have previously mentioned, there is also a mountain of paperwork to tackle, qualifications to renew for health and safety, spraying or Red Tractor. It is also a chance to review business plans and prepare for the new year. It is easy to forget that farming is a business. We too make plans and budgets, undertake training, organise the accounts, the list goes on- much like any other business. Usually this is undertaken between tasks outside, and during harvest, when time allows (usually late at night!).

As we approach winter, we can take stock and look back on the past year and



RUDOLF THE RED-NOSED REINDEER WAS A GIRL!



In real life reindeer might not be able to fly but they are still amazing creatures. Here are a few facts about them which might interest and amuse you.

You will all have seen pictures of Santa's sleigh being pulled by reindeer and many of you will know all their names, too. What you possibly don't know is that they all must have been females. Uniquely among the more than 45 species of deer, both males and females grow antlers BUT the males shed their antlers in Autumn or early Winter (after the rut), whereas the females keep theirs until Spring in order to defend their fawns and dig in the snow for food. Since Christmas falls towards the end of December, and the pictures show reindeer with antlers, it follows that they were all female – including Rudolf!

If you see reindeer in the snow, you will notice that snow doesn't melt on their coat, and if they lie down in the snow, it doesn't melt underneath them. This is because they

have an incredibly dense, soft undercoat and the top layer consists of long, hollow hair tubes. The two coats trap air and prevent heat escaping from the animals' bodies and the hollow tubes also give the reindeer their white colour.

Reindeer eyes change colour according to the season. In Summer their eyes are golden brown, but they change to blue in Winter to help them to see in the Arctic darkness. They are also able to see ultraviolet light – the only mammals that can.

Another way reindeer have evolved to avoid freezing in Winter is, they produce their own antifreeze! They have ethanol in their blood, which comes from the moss and lichen they eat. The amount of ethanol in their blood is 1.3 times greater in Winter than in Summer. As ethanol is a type of alcohol, you could say that reindeer are permanently tipsy once the weather turns cold. Reindeer are the only deer with this ability, but there is a type of horse, the Yakut horse, which can do the same thing.

Reindeer feet change shape in Winter. In order to be able to travel in snow and ice, reindeer footpads shrink and tighten in Winter exposing the edge of the hoof. This gives them better grip and protects the soft part of the foot. In Summer the foot pads spread and become spongy making it easier to travel across the soft tundra.

Reindeer are unique in many ways, but I am afraid they still can't fly (except at Christmas, of course!).

WELWYN CHRISTMAS TREE LIGHTS



CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS

Christmas just wouldn't be the same without traditional food and activities, but have you ever wondered where our festive customs come from?

Writing this still almost two months before Christmas Day, the first thing that we associate with Christmas is already in evidence....mince pies! Have you had one already? When did they become part of our tradition and were they always a sweet, spiced filling in shortcrust pastry? No, they were not. In 1413 King Henry V served a mincemeat pie at his coronation. As the name suggests, the filling would have been finely minced mutton, rabbit, pork or game with chopped up fruit and a preserving liquid and served as a main course.

Sticking with the food theme, are you looking forward to a turkey dinner? Turkeys seem to have begun to feature in Christmas dinners during the sixteenth century, increasing in popularity until now there are some nine million turkeys bought each year in the UK for Christmas. Do not be thinking that they originated in Turkey though. They came from the Americas and arrived in Europe after the Spanish conquest of the Aztec empire. Welwyn being a rural community, holly and mistletoe are not hard to see. Using holly as seasonal decoration for our homes has pagan origins. But it was subsequently adopted as a symbol of Christ's crown of thorns, the crimson berries a symbol of his blood and the evergreen a metaphor for life after death. Mistletoe on the other hand has rather

different, romantic connotations. Once again, hanging mistletoe was done by Druids to protect against evil spirits. It was in Norse mythology that kissing under the mistletoe originated. In the UK this seems to date back to the 1700s.

Some 150 years ago, Tom Smith invented the Christmas cracker with its explosive mechanism to simulate the crackling of a log fire, and inclusion of a motto. His son, Walter, added the hats and novelties.



A much more recent tradition, (not yet universally adopted!), is the Christmas jumper. Snowflake symbols were incorporated in the designs of Nordic jumpers some time ago, but more demonstrably Christmas scenes seem to have been popularised after the film Bridget Jones' Diary appeared in 2001. They now even have their own day: Thursday 7th December. Time to get yours out of storage!

WHAT INVENTION MADE IN YOUR LIFETIME.......

The question above was recently put to me by my daughter Alexis. She has been putting a different question to me each week and plans to put all my answers together for the grandchildren. Perhaps this question might have you wondering what your reply might be?

Here's what I wrote:

Inevitably the first thing that comes to mind is the mobile phone, or more specifically the smartphone which now does everything one previously needed to open a computer for. Before that we used books, a library, even one's brain. Thanks to the internet one can now check out all those things that one can no longer remember, or never knew in the first place. Yes, I have probably googled a few things for this, to find out what was invented in my lifetime or before that. But has the smartphone with its camera, access to the internet, my calendar, emails and more, really had the biggest impact on my life? That's worth a bit more thought and research...

In the home automatic washing machines, dishwashers etc have all made life far easier than it was for my grandmother, but they were mostly invented way before I was born. The first dishwasher was invented by a woman in the 1920s. Washing machines have become far more automated in my lifetime; as a child we had a round tub with a paddle that went round and back, swishing the clothes in soapy water. There was a mangle on top to wind the washing through to take out the water.

Our cat was fascinated by the swishing paddle and walked around the rim watching! I seem to recall she once fell in, but I might misremember this as it was a continuous worry that she might. So household appliances, many and useful as they are, are not really most impactful for me.

Cars, too, are far more sophisticated than when I learnt to drive. The first automatic gear car was back in 1940, so although I love the ease of automatic gear change, it was invented before my birth. Electric cars are more recent, but probably these will be short-lived soon only to be overtaken by hydrogen as a fuel. I loved riding my bike as a teenager, but it had no gears. When my friend got a new one with gears I tried it and thought it too complicated!

The NHS was hardly an invention, but I include it as it started in 1948 when I was two, and surely it has impacted everyone's life ever since, health care that is free. Dentistry that allowed me to have straight teeth: I wore the inevitable brace from age 10. Back then braces were not fixed so I had to put mine in at night and they could be gradually tightened. Fixed braces were not commonly available until the 1970s, but wire braces like mine were around way before I was born.

A medical invention of 1950 caused a transformation in the lives of my generation of young women. First prescribed in the UK in 1961 and known as The Pill, was an oral contraceptive to be taken daily, giving

women the freedom to follow careers and have their families at a time to suit them.

At the turn of the millennium, a further medical invention was approved, that of freezing eggs which allowed women to delay the start of their family (to say 35 or even 40 years of age) knowing that their career is established enough at that point.

Another medical advance to help women is HRT (hormone replacement therapy) which controls the unpleasant side effects of menopause. This was widely popular when first introduced in the 1990s, but has since attracted controversy, with links to increased risks of breast cancer. Like all new advances in medicine there are risks as well as benefits. Recent research now claims benefits outweigh the risks.

In about 1971 I was chosen to be a "guinea pig" at Moorfields Eye Hospital where research was being conducted on newly invented soft contact lenses. Previously, perfected around 1948, only hard contact lenses were available, and they took quite some getting used to. The new soft lenses could be worn comfortably straight away. There was a bit of a faff having to sterilise the soft lenses overnight but I happily went back and forth regularly to Moorfields for the researchers to study these lenses and their effect on my eyes. They discovered my eyes did not make enough tears and that the soft lenses became scratched. They had to be replaced fairly frequently, all for free. At the end of the research

I could have continued to wear them, except I would have had to pay for new lenses every few months at a cost of about £100, an astronomical sum in the early 1970s (equal to over £1,900 in today's money). I went back to wearing glasses!

In 2008 I had another go at wearing contact lenses, and by then daily contact lenses were available. However, I needed glasses for reading, so varifocals were much easier than having contact lenses and reading glasses as well. Varifocals were invented in 1959 so could possibly be a contender for the biggest invention to affect my life, but.....

There is yet another medical invention which has most affected my life today. This is a surgical procedure first done in 1968 and was seen as one of the most important orthopaedic surgical advances of the twentieth century - a total knee replacement. My left knee was replaced in 2018. In 2021 I received a right knee operation which was an Oxford partial knee replacement. These were a later innovation, and first implanted in a patient in 1976. It is an operation with a faster recovery time. The arthritic pain I would now be in if knee replacements had not been invented is unimaginable.

So my vote goes to 'knee replacement' for being the invention that has had the biggest impact on my life.
What would yours be?

I popped into Welwyn Parish Council Offices at the end of October and it was a hive of activity. The team of volunteers who put up the Christmas lights

in Welwyn village were busy making preparations, replacing bulbs, checking connections and PAT testing all of the electrical equipment. There was also a team of workers installing electric panel radiators which are being re-used from the Whitehill Centre following the installation of their new boiler and central the entries from children in the Parish heating system by the Parish Council, drop off's for 'Fixed by Dave' were taking place and the staff were busily collating entries for the KS1 and KS2 childrens' Christmas card competitions while taking seasonal bookings for the Parishes numerous function rooms / halls.

For 10 months of the year the Christmas lights are unceremoniously stored in a couple of wheelie bins and locked up in the disused public toilets next to the Parish offices in Lockleys drive, then at the end of October under the supervision of Cllr Bill Morris the Welwyn Village Christmas light operation springs into action. Once the checks have been completed the installation volunteers take to the streets armed with high visibility waistcoats and ladders to string the lights along the building facades. It is not just the volunteers that

we need to thank for this, there are also the businesses and private individuals that agree to plug the lights in to their properties – with arrangements often as simple as opening a sash window plugging the lights into a wall socket and sealing any draft off with a towel as a draft excluder under the closed sash!

Fingers crossed that the weather holds for the annual event of turning on the Welwyn Christmas lights. This occurs at 5.15pm or thereabouts on Friday 1st December and is assisted by the overall winner of the annual Christmas Card competition arranged by Welwyn Parish Council. Entries closed for this on 15th November to allow time for judging (Digswell, Oaklands, Mardley Heath and Welwyn) in Reception/KS1 (aged 4-7) and KS2 (aged 8-11). It is always such a difficult decision for the judges with so many fabulous entries, prizes are awarded for 1st, 2nd and 3rd in each Category. Prize giving takes place at 4.30pm at St Marys Church just before singing starts in the Church. Do come along if you are able to.

As mentioned above, Welwyn Parish Council in Lockleys Drive, Welwyn, AL6 9NT is a drop off location for 'Fixed by Dave'. This, for those of you who have not heard of it yet, is a repair service for small electrical appliances. Rather than throwing away that faulty food mixer or garden pressure washer you can get it repaired for a small fee by 'Fixed by Dave', a local company. Simply book a repair online,

Becoming a drop off location is one of the Parish Council's Climate Emergency Action Group's initiatives to encourage repair and re-use where possible.

Repair and re-use has been the modus operandi for maintenance in our busy Welwyn Parish offices at Lockleys Drive for many years. This wooden building was erected 50 years ago. Now some 20 years later its design life is no longer fit for purpose by modern standards and is in need of replacing. We will be bringing

forward plans within the next 12 months to replace this building and re-purpose the site of the former public toilets, hopefully this time with a more sympathetic design to complement our conservation area, with a new building to serve the Parish for another 50 years or more, with modern staff offices and vastly improved hire facilities for parishioners. We look forward to sharing the details in the next few months.

Some crimes are more prevalent over the festive season, Parcel scams surge because people are pleased, rather than puzzled, to receive

news of a surprise package. Ignore messages supposedly from delivery companies unless they include information that makes it certain they are genuine. Never pay an extra fee. The text may say £1.99 but once you give scammers your payment details, they will take a lot more.

Make sure the Christmas presents in your home cannot be seen through any window. After Christmas, do not leave the boxes for expensive gifts outside by the bins, this advertises that the item is in your house and the packaging would allow a thief to pass it off as new.

Burglars know that many people go away for Christmas, so do everything possible to make your house look 'lived in' while empty. As well as leaving lights on indoors, festive outside lights set on a timer switch are a good addition. They require a plug

socket that can be accessed without leaving a window or door open.

When you are at a busy public event, such as a Christmas market, remember there may be pickpockets in the crowd. Keep your handbag closed, and your wallet and phone in a secure pocket. Take care when paying, and watch out for sudden distractions that could be a deliberate ploy to rob you.

If you are shopping or delivering presents, keep any tempting items in the boot of your car and make sure nobody sees you put them there.

Do not let pressure to buy the ultimate gift stop you from taking the usual sensible precautions when shopping online. Take great care if there is a 'hard to get' item this Christmas as this is a perfect opportunity for scammers. Never buy in haste.

STORIES FROM THE BAPTISM BOOK AT AYOT ST PETER



In 1896, the Ayot St Peter rector, Henry Jephson, completed the title page of a smart new baptismal register. He would perhaps

be surprised to learn that the same book is still in use in our church today! A glance through the pages gives a snapshot of some of the social changes over the years. The very first entry on 30th August 1896 was for Irene Thomas, whose father was a surgeon. The family lived in Welwyn and by the 1920s occupied Bridge House. This baptism was followed by many for children whose fathers were agricultural labourers. There were numerous rural occupations that barely exist today, such as 'cowman', 'shepherd' or 'ploughman'. Other entries tell of the time when more people were employed as domestic servants, including 'coachman', 'gardener' and 'groom'.

Some occupations remain familiar — 'farmer', 'carpenter', 'plumber', 'game keeper' or 'publican', whilst others, such as 'blacksmith', are perhaps less common but remain skilled crafts today. Other jobs are representative of the time when our village had a railway station - 'plate-layer', 'railwayman' and 'loco driver'. Violet Etteridge of Whitehill, baptised in 1903, had a father who was a 'gas maker' which

sounds most unusual, and possibly rather dangerous!

On 28th July 1918, baby Stanley Peglar was baptised. His father Ralph was a 'soldier on active service'. Happily, Ralph survived the war and afterwards worked as a domestic gardener in Northaw. In the Second World War, the fathers' occupations included 'gunner', 'soldier', 'RAF' and even 'Lt Colonel, Royal Engineers'. Several residents worked at nearby de Havilland in Hatfield and had roles such as 'aircraft fitter' and 'aeronautical engineer'.

Nowadays, the occupations of mothers are also included. Looking at the recent entries, there are some jobs that would have been familiar in Victorian times, such as 'lawyer', 'banker' and 'teacher'; but I wonder what they would have made of 'PR consultant'?!

Back to the present day, our festive season begins with the Carol Service on Sunday 10th December and continues with the traditional Crib Service on 24th December. On Christmas Day our service will be Holy Communion. Why not walk to the church to work up an appetite for lunch?

All services will be led by The Rev'd Canon Dr David Munchin and begin at 11.15am.

We wish all our readers a very Happy Christmas and a peaceful New Year.
