

Primary Reports

Team Rector's Report - The Rev'd Dr David Munchin

This will be read aloud; copies to be made available at the meeting.

PCC Secretaries' Report – Louise and David Hughes

The secretaries' responsibilities include ensuring that correct procedure is followed by the PCC, issuing notices of meetings in good time, ensuring that reports are prepared on time, preparing the agenda for meetings, dealing with correspondence, preparing the minutes of meetings, keeping a check on the parish diary and knowing what is going on in the life of the churches generally. The APCM booklet was also prepared by the secretaries in advance of the annual meeting.

Parochial Church Council Meetings continued to be held every other month throughout 2023 as normal and once the welcome and opening prayer and apologies for absence have been done meetings usually begin with finance reports from the treasurer - Maggie Varco. At the beginning of the year MV estimated a deficit in church finances of £35,000 for the year, mainly due to the anticipated additional cost of gas to heat the church and Church House as well as increased cost of electricity. Much thought was given by members of the Council to ways of raising income to mitigate these increases and during the year a lot of people put in a great deal of effort to raise funds so it is pleasing to be able to report that by the end of the year the deficit had been reduced to £6,000. Appointments and resignations: During the year the PCC was sorry to lose the services and wise counsel of Sue Keach who decided that it was time to stand down from the PCC and as a church warden at St Michael's. Sheona Eggington and Geoff Cummings also decided to call time as trustees of the PCC. The PCC is duly grateful for their contributions.

In their place the PCC was pleased to welcome Mavis Francis, Helen McKay and Christine Allday as new members. Mavis also joined Vernonne Allan and Colin Hull as a representative to the Deanery Synod.

A new fire safety system was successfully installed at St Mary's in order to comply with current regulations and an emergency evacuation drill was successfully carried out after one of the Sunday services.

The minutes of PCC meetings have followed the progress of the rector's Mission Action Plan, Crystal Lam's support for the elderlies project and Robert Milner's innovations with the choir as the Director of Music. Additionally various policies including health and safety and legacy policy have been brought up-to-date.

David Hughes transcribed the minutes of the PCC meetings to report style for publication in The Welwyn Magazine.

Welwyn Hatfield Deanery Synod Report

– Vernonne Allan

St Mary's Church is a member of the Welwyn Hatfield Deanery. Deanery Synod Meetings bring together all Anglican clergy of Welwyn and Hatfield as well as all Readers and laity representatives from each church.

Currently I am a laity member representing St Mary's Welwyn. This year Mavis Francis joined as a second lay member. Colin Hull attends as a Reader. St Michael's and All Angels, Woolmer Green did not have a representative this year.

The synod receives reports on General Synod matters and meetings, diocesan synod meetings and the work of the Diocesan Board of Finance and its various committees. The Synod also considers safeguarding and data protection issues at each meeting. In addition, the pastoral committee of the deanery synod has regard to the wellbeing of the clergy.

Three meetings took place this year in churches across the deanery: in March at St Etheldreda's in Hatfield, in June at St Mary Magdalene's, Hatfield Hyde and in and October at All Saints Church, Datchworth. The PCC received reports on these meetings.

In March Rev. Canon David Kesterton was guest speaker: based at All Saints with St. Peter's in Luton, David spoke of his experience working with refugees and asylum seekers over the past three years; St Peter's is part of the "City of Sanctuary" building a network of support across the country.

In June the guest speaker was Kate Ford who gave a timely talk on "One off gifts and legacies." She recommended the advantages of the Parish Giving Scheme which makes life much easier for Parish Treasurers. This is now recommended at St Mary's and St Michael's for regular giving.

In October the guest speaker was Rev Tim Bull – Diocesan

Director of Vocations who addressed the question "how worried should we be about Artificial Intelligence?" After much discussion and questions, the answer was "We don't need to worry about AI, we need to worry about the people using AI".

It is hoped that a member of the congregation of St Michael's will join the lay representative team: with only three meetings a year, excellent guest speakers, as well as insight into the operation and aims of our deanery, our diocese and of General Synod, it is a privilege to be involved.

Team Council Report – The Rev'd Dr David Munchin

The Team Council met on three occasions in 2023 – 15th March, 14th June and 27th September The Team Council consists of the Team Rector, five representatives of the Ministry Team and two lay representatives from each church.

The purposes and tasks of the Team Council are laid out in its constitution.

Matters discussed in these meeting included:

- Safeguarding (Child and Vulnerable Adult Protection)
- Team events and activities (e.g. Summer Evensongs)

St Mary's Safeguarding Report – Vicky Jenkin

No safeguarding issues identified. One incident was escalated but it was deemed pastoral and was dealt with by David Munchin.

St Mary's Fabric Report - Stuart Jenkin

St. Mary's Church Welwyn – Fabric Report to the APCM for the year 2023

1. **Heating -** Both the church and Church House have been kept at a comfortable level of heating through the cold period. We continue to experience control problems and are still seeking anyone with experience on a Trend BMS system.

2. **The Eastern Cemetery Wall** - The Eastern wall that fell down in Feb 2020 was completely rebuilt by the Parish council managed by local Architect Francesca Weal Associates during the year

3. **Roof safe System** - This has been upgraded to meet current regulations.

4. **Water Heater** - A new water heater for the Kitchen was installed after the failure of the existing boiler.

5. **Hot water Urn** - in the kitchen. This unit failed and was replaced with a new one.

6. **Trees in the Churchyard** - The Parish council removed the dead Cherry Tree and trimmed back the oak tree by the main entrance. They also carried out a tree survey of all the trees in the Churchyard.

7. **Concrete Path** - Several of the concrete slabs that form the pathway to the side gate had settled causing a trip hazard. The parish council has repaired these slabs.

8. **External Lighting** - The external lighting is coming towards the end of its economic life. However, various repairs have now been carried out together with replacing the timer system which should keep it going for a while.

9. **Lightning Conductor** - After inspection it was found that the lightning conductor needed upgrade works. These have been completed.

10. **Emergency Lighting** - Upon inspection it was found several of the emergency lights had failed. These have now been replaced.

11. **Removal of Rubbish** - A substantial amount of rubbish and redundant equipment had accumulated outside Church House. A contractor was hired who efficiently removed it.

12. **Sustainability** - The PCC is keen to explore initiatives wherever possible to strive to meet Net Carbon Zero requirements.

13. **Gardening** - A new bench has been installed in the Memorial Garden. The gardening team continue to maintain this area.

14. **Wi-Fi** - The Wi-Fi router failed in Church House. This has been replaced with a new one.

15. **Pipe Leak** - A pipe in Church House roof was found to be leaking and damaging the ceiling and cupboard boxing in the storeroom. This has now been repaired.

16. **Compliance** - During the year the following have been completed • Gas safety certificate for boiler • Lightning Conductor testing • Roof Safety inspection • Fire Extinguishers inspection. • Emergency Lights inspection • Lift Service Church House • Man safe roof system • Roof Alarm testing • Fire alarm Testing • Insurance Engineering Report on Lift & Boiler • Gutter Cleaning • Kitchen Deep clean and grease extract clean

<u>St Michael's Church, Woolmer Green Fabric Report</u> – Chris Allday

1 The fire extinguishers were checked and replaced where necessary.

2 The gutters have been cleaned.

3 Some of the tiles on the North side of the roof have started flaking. They were inspected by the roofer and it was decided just to monitor the roof at this stage. The roof is weather proof.

4 The church is cleaned once a month and the Romanian Congregation tidy up after all their services, so the church looks clean and well cared for.

5 We have a new contractor for churchyard maintenance and this seems to be working well.

6 The organ was cleaned and repaired.

7 Our next electrical inspection is due in October 2026.

8 A new lock was fitted to the outer vestry door.

9 We are due for a quinquennial inspection.

St Michael's remains well cared for and as visitors to the church often remark 'It is a lovely church. '

Secondary Reports

Arpeggios Hand Bell Ringers- Jenny McCann

The group originated in 1986 and has performed extensively across the County. We are very fortunate to use the extensive range of Handbells covering more than three octaves which belong to the Church.

Over recent years there has been a decline in membership due to ill-health and retirement and 2023 was no exception. The group ideally needs at least eight ringers but has been obliged to curtail its musical repertoire to accommodate fewer. Nevertheless, we continued to meet regularly on Thursday afternoons in Church House throughout the earlier part of the year and in July once again were invited to perform at the Wednesday Community Club at Potters Bar Baptist Church where we received a very warm response. Due to illness and holidays, practices were few and far between from August onwards as we worked towards an engagement to ring for the St Mary's Church Fellowship "Christmas Surprise" on 12 December which was enjoyed by all. This performance was dedicated to the memory of one of our longest serving members Pauline Anderson, the lynch pin of the group, who died on 9th December 2023 after a short illness.

Bible Discovery – Gay and Mike Carpenter

We know from our own experience that the best way to learn, and enjoy learning, is in a group of fellow explorers where there is mutual respect and a growing fellowship which is never exclusive but open and welcoming to newcomers. Our aim is to try and provide this at Bible Discovery.

At the beginning of the year, we found we had 4 sessions before stopping to join in with the Lent course. We invited people to choose a person from the Bible, or elsewhere, and choices included Daniel, David, Ruth, Susannah from the Apocrypha and St. Bernadette of Lourdes.

In 2021, we had begun an exploration of St. Luke's Gospel which we planned to resume in the summer term, but, due to illness, we only managed one session. To try and make up for this big hole in our fellowship, we organized a summer tea party on our lawn for September 7th so we could meet up and enjoy Katie's wonderful spread.

Then back to St. Luke in the autumn term. Two things that stood out for us as we pored over the Gospel were Luke's special concern for the marginalized which directed him to record such incidents notable in the parables as The Good Samaritan and Prodigal Son. And the other was how easy it is to misinterpret a passage because we don't know the 1st century setting.

At Christmas, we all decided we'd like to do something for charity and we chose to support Tina Banks of ALFS. Tina suggested we might like to fill shoe boxes for a community she was supporting where bereaved wives and their children were living together. We had a wonderful evening cramming all sorts of gifts into 64 boxes, and later received a video of the children opening them looking so happy and excited. That was like a Christmas present to all of us.

<u>Wednesday Morning Breakfast Bible Study</u> – The Rev'd Dr David Munchin

Every Wednesday morning a group meets in Church House from 8am – 9am with breakfast provided from Katie's. We study the bible by looking at the three readings for the following Sunday. We use a version of *lectio divina* before meandering off to whatever takes our fancy. All are welcome, breakfast is free, you can say what you want and get the drop on the Sunday preacher.

Birds and Pray – Colin Hull (Birds and Wildlife Group)

Formed in Nov 2022 we are a small group of bird and wildlife enthusiasts who take local walks to together to enjoy God's creation and pray with thanks for what we see. Immersing ourselves in creation is an immersion in prayer.

Lent courses followed a home- grown course written by our curate, Christie on the Psalms. There were seven well attended groups. It was good to have a biblical course, written by a local expert, on a book which contains perhaps the most complete companion to all emotions evoked by the human condition.

<u>Church Wardens' Report, St Mary's, Welwyn</u> – Diane Jenkin and Stuart Westley

The demands of the pandemic now seem well in the past. It is though assuring to reflect that we no longer need to maintain eagle eyed surveillance of our congregations. The fear that an aspect of the regulations might be infringed, possibly prompting an insensitive intervention, happily has gone. The regulations are now dismantled. Much pre-covid practice has been restored but not collections during the services, use of cash now being much reduced. The card reader is clearly a permanent feature.

We have seen increased hiring of Church House around its regular use by Church Groups. This is in line with the intentions of those who so admirably brought about the construction of Church House some fifteen years ago. Their wish was that in addition for providing a high-quality building for worshippers, Church House would also act as a welcoming social point for groups within the village. So, it is proving, with the building used by a variety of groups for quite interesting, diverse, purposes. If you think hiring the building might help with planning whatever function you might have in mind, please do not hesitate to be in touch; we can often oblige and we wish to do so.

Few will now be unaware that in the last year our financial situation has become uncomfortable, largely caused by costs, particularly those connected with utilities, rising alarmingly. In the Autumn the situation was spelled out with clarity and with sensitivity. The message appears well understood within the community; it has produced a generous and encouraging response, including from regular users of Church House, who have accepted modest increases in the hire charge. There is though more to do to reach where we need to be. The increased income from letting Church House is a small but important step towards the goal, with the opportunity for the momentum to continue to build.

Similarly, few within the Church will be unaware of the need to increase volunteers or of the large number of tasks which need to be undertaken on a regular basis to enable the Church to function as we all wish. In February the Rector led an initiative designed to encourage those able to come forward to do so. There has been a tangible and encouraging response. So, thank you most warmly those who have volunteered, no names, but you know who you are, and so do we! That's great!

It's equally important to be aware of those who do volunteer regularly, often providing time consuming, irreplaceable services which, because they are done without fanfare, we easily overlook. Maybe we might focus slightly less on areas of shortage and rather more on the amazing contributions of many who enable our Church community much more than just to tick over? I write this (behind schedule) a few hours after seeing and hearing with delight a full row of junior choristers opening our Mothering Sunday Service. Well Done children! You have embarked upon a fantastically fulfilling initiative which includes providing pleasure for others. You are immensely welcome.

One of many instances of teamwork enables our Church to be open to everyone for quiet prayer and reflection every day of the year, an important but, rightly, unheralded service to the community. We do not shut up for holidays; we find a way to cope with them and we intend that to continue.

Thank you for your help and encouragement as we aim to support our Church and its congregation.

<u>St Michael and All Angels, Woolmer Green</u> – Sue Keach and Jackie Davis

Once again we have had a busy year at St Michael's. Several of our activities have been fund raisers, but this is no bad thing. Getting together to organise the events has a team building effect, and by inviting people into the church we show the wider community that we at St Michael's church are very much alive.

During the cold winter months, we ran a Warm Space in the village hall on Monday afternoons for people to get a cuppa and a cake or pastry that had been donated by Knebworth Co-op. It was a good opportunity to meet new people and have a chat.

The first event was a plant sale and coffee morning. We had let the large plant sale lapse but were persuaded to run a pared down event. People donated their surplus plants. We did very well, and it was a happy occasion although it did serve to remind us that running even a cut down version still takes a good deal of energy. Last year's effort will be our last plant sale. (Though we did say that before!)

We, as usual, ran the tea tent at Woolmer Green village day. This year the weather was against us! It was a warm day and people were wanting something cool and long to drink rather than a good cup of tea! We sold a lot of cake but our takings were down.

In September we celebrated the Feast of St. Michael by having an open day in the church. We drew people's attention to the church building which is much appreciated by members of the 'Arts and Crafts' movement, who consider it to be a fine example of this style of architecture. Two local architects with a keen interest in the period gave informative illustrated talks and we now look at our place of worship in a different light.

As well as highlighting the church building, we reminded people of one of Woolmer Green's most colourful past

residents, Harry McDonald, the local woodcarver. Stevenage Museum Service lent us examples of his work, as did local residents and Woolmer Green Parish Council. It was a joy to see them all together and to remember the days when Harry's carved model village stood on the corner of Mardelbury road. Judith Watson was the inspiration behind this event and we should like to thank her and Gill Blewett for their research and hard work in arranging it. We are also very grateful to Jacky from the Red Lion who provided refreshments and generously gave all the proceeds to swell church funds.

We were very pleased that having been ordained priest by the Bishop of Hertford on the previous day, Christie chose to preside over her first Eucharist at Woolmer Green. The church was packed with her friends and relations. We all felt it a great privilege to witness Christie's next step in her ordained ministry.

We are enjoying having Christie as our curate and have welcomed her work in forging links between the church and St. Michael's school. Her Christian club is flourishing, and the whole school regularly come into the church to worship. The year passed by with the usual landmarks. The Lent group studied some of the psalms and the meetings were well attended, as was the moving 'Stations of the Cross 'service on Good Friday. We had a traditional Harvest Festival followed by an enjoyable bring and share lunch. Thanks to Penny, the band and choir the Christmas services were beautiful. As usual the most popular seasonal service was the Crib Service on Christmas Eve. It was a joy to hear the children sing a new arrangement of 'While Shepherds Watch 'and to accompany it with gusto on percussion instruments.

One innovation this year has been our bi-monthly St Michael's meeting in the Red Lion pub. Folk were not keen to go out in the dark winter's evenings but this slot after our Sunday Service has hit the spot and is well attended. A glass of beer/wine and a delicious Sunday lunch seemed to help everything go with a swing as we ate our way through the agenda! Our first quiz since prior to Covid took place in October. It was a sell-out - Christie's questions were well received as was the fish 'n' chip supper.

An attractive play area has been created at the back of St Michael's for the toddlers that are now attending some services. This has partly been responsible for some parents saying how welcome they feel at St Michael's. As you will realise St Michael's Church Woolmer Green is an active and busy church. Why not come and join us?

<u>The Community Café</u> - Liz Hesketh written by Ian Skidmore

The Community Café was founded as a joint venture between St Mary's Parochial Church Council and the Welwyn Parish Plan Group. From small beginnings in November 2009, it has gone from strength to strength, weathering the Covid pandemic along the way.

The objective was to provide a place in Welwyn where people could go for a cup of coffee or tea, not a commercial operation but a community facility, open for a couple of hours once a week every week. As such it would, we hoped, attract a regular clientele not just people popping in for a cup every now and then, as might happen with a coffee shop. And so, it has proved. Some of our regulars have been with us from the beginning and we have a real café community, not just a Community Café.

For a venture such as this to be successful several factors must be in place.

An attractive venue: Church House fits the bill perfectly. In addition, as part of the JV we are not charged for its use, which allows us to keep our costs and thus our charges to a minimum.

Good management: Since starting in 2009 we have had five volunteer Café managers:

Jill Elsdon, Barbara Spencer, Lesley Watson, Jean Perriman and Liz Hesketh. They have been the backbone of the café and without them the project would have died a long time ago. The unsung part of their role has been and remains keeping the café finances on an even keel.

Willing Volunteers: Too many to count but each one committing to at least one session a month and willing to step in to fill gaps when one occurs. Some have been volunteering since 2009!

Customers! Or rather familiar friends and the raison d'etre of the café. Some again have been with us since the beginning. Typically, we have between 40 and 50 people joining us each week.

The café has always produced a small surplus each year, split between the PCC and the Parish Plan Group. It was very small but still there during the Covid years. Recently however, the cost of supplies, which have gradually increased over the years have reached the point where we had to increase charges so on November 1st 2023, 14 years after the café started, we increased our prices for the first time. Our customers have taken this in their stride and we are as busy as ever.

Community Lunch – Mavis Francis

We started the lunches again in January 2023 after a break during COVID. These have been well attended and according to guests have been really appreciated. Many are living on their own and state that it is lovely to have a meal with others whilst making new friends. We have to thank Maria and her team from Fizz Catering for both the excellent food and service. £682 was donated to the Fabric fund for St. Mary's during 2023. We have now started another year of lunches and extend our thanks to the Danesbury charity shop for their involvement.

Fellowship – Marcia Khan

Our Christmas "Surprise" was snowfall, but a small group of us braved the weather to meet up in Church House for hot drinks, tasty mince pies and Stollen. January's lunch was very enjoyable and we will be distributing the menu and booking form for our lunch on 9th January 2024 at our meeting on 14th November, as bookings and payment need to be made at our 12th December meeting.

2023's talks have included "Butterfly Volunteers at Lister Hospital", "The History of Bread", "Life with Ukrainian Guests", "Painters in their own Pictures?", "Living in Norway" and our delicious Strawberry Tea took place in July.

Details of future meetings are usually posted in Church pew sheets and on the back cover of the Welwyn magazine together with my contact details.

Everyone is welcome to join us for our meetings, which are followed by tea and cakes. We request a £2 donation per person towards refreshments, a raffle and donation to charities.

Fairtrade – Maggie Varco and the Fairtrade team

St. Mary's fairtrade café and stall is open on Saturday mornings from 10am – 11.30am in Church House, and is run by our team of volunteers. The drop-in café is a popular meeting place and offers a warm welcome to newcomers to the church.

We were saddened when Traidcraft plc went into administration in January 2023 following a number of years of financial difficulties. Since the fairtrade stall started in St Mary's over 20 years ago, Traidcraft has been our supplier of fairtrade goods. They provided valuable information and inspiration too about the importance of supporting producers in the global south and they were a pioneering organisation launching the fairtrade movement in the UK.

There are other fairtrade suppliers out there but none has such a wide variety of different products nor is geared towards supporting small groups such as ours who run church stalls. After ordering from 4 or 5 of these companies for a few months, it proved too cumbersome and timeconsuming and we decided to close the fairtrade stall in the autumn.

We sold the remaining stock by the end of the year but we continue to run the thriving drop-in café serving fairtrade tea, coffee and biscuits for the church 'regulars' and the wider village community.

The role of GAG is twofold: -

Charitable: to facilitate charitable giving by St Mary's to aim for a target equivalent to at least 15% of planned and plate giving on a rolling three-year average.

St Mary's Bellringing Band – John Williams

In 2023 St Mary's Ringing Band rang regularly before Sunday Services from 9.00 - 9.30am (every Sunday). Unfortunately, due to a reduction in band members, ringing for Sunday Evening Services has ceased for the time being. We were usually able to ring at least six of the eight bells for services. The band practised on Tuesdays from 7.45 to 9.00pm. In addition, the band rang a standard 6 bells for weddings when booked - and 8 for special services when requested, the latter dependent band member availability. The band also maintained the clock, hoisted and lowered flags on the Tower when required and looked after visiting bands. In 2023 we rang for six weddings, hosted four district practices and three visiting bands who rang quarter peals (45) – 60 minutes of continuous ringing). We also hosted a visiting band from Epping/Waltham Abbey. The band also rang to mark the coronation of King Charles III. We have lost a number of ringers and currently have only 10 regular ringers. Only 3 are Church members so St. Mary's owes a debt of gratitude to all the band for turning out for Sunday and special service ringing so reliably - unlike so many towers where service ringing is occasional, not regular. It takes some time to become a competent ringer so it needs determination, but we do have an enjoyable time on the way. Please consider whether you might like to learn to ring and enjoy the gentle aerobic exercise (and the not so healthy – but optional - social activity after the practice). <u>bells@welwyn.org.uk</u>. It's one person on each rope, so to ring all our 8 bells we need 8 ringers. It goes without saying that if you have rung in the past and are not currently part of a band that rings on Sundays you would be very welcome at St Mary's, Welwyn.

St Mary's Flower Team – Jenny Wiseman

The team got together to decorate the church for the three main festivals, Easter, Harvest and Christmas. In addition, we marked the Coronation in May with special arrangements and chose red and gold for our colour theme.

85 lilies to remember loved ones were sponsored at Easter. The Chapel of Repose was decorated for Maundy Thursday and we used twisted hazel branches supplied by Linda Dobbs who had recently pruned her trees. For the three hours of the watch, the candle-lit chapel looked beautiful.

We were responsible for the flowers for 3 weddings during 2023. We did arrangements during the year to contribute to special events: Rob and Vernonne' s golden wedding anniversary, the memorial service for Peter Lee, flowers in memory of Beryl Hammond and Dennis Dinsdale. At Easter and Christmas, we arranged flowers in memory of Fiona and Rowena's parents, and for members of the Lund family.

Mothering Sunday daffodil posies were produced by the team and other volunteers.

We are doing our best to be "green" by using chicken wire as the base for dishes and troughs. It is more difficult to use this than floral oasis. I do try and get the bio-degradable Oasis, but this still takes a long time to break down in landfill. We'll keep persevering though! Apologies to Hyacinth to give you the short straw for your first time with the team. I asked her to do a trough using chicken wire! With a name like Hyacinth though – she <u>must</u> be in the Flower Team.

At the end of the year, we were very sad to learn of the deaths of two much valued members: Pat Lewis and Valerie Ryan. Pat had moved a couple of years ago to Gloucestershire. She was a very experienced Constance Spry trained flower arranger. Her words of advice will stay with me forever: "Always leave room for the butterflies" and "If in doubt, leave it out".

Valerie had moved from Kent to Welwyn a few years ago and we were lucky enough to have her decorate the pulpit for many of our recent festivals.

May they rest in peace.

St Mary's Choir - Rob Milner

When I joined, the choir had been through some challenging times – with Covid and changes in leadership. I think we pulled together well when I joined, getting the choir back to its traditions pre-Covid – with the choir supporting worship at the 9:30 service and being able to let rip a bit more at the monthly evensong.

Membership has, on the whole, grown with new members coming in to all parts. We have had 3 long standing members retire after long service to the choir. We also welcomed a Ukrainian refugee who is now studying singing at Leeds Conservatoire (and singing at Leeds Minster choir). Choirs survive only by getting new members join and we do need more in all parts – particularly men. We have a talented bunch of singers but a low number of tenors and basses restricts what we can sing.

We have recruited 2 new organists to the church – Malcolm and Roger – who share the role between them and they tell me they also love playing at St Mary's. We have a choral scholarship scheme running – encouraging secondary age children to learn the rich repertoire of church music we're privileged to sing. We currently have 3 roles filled but can have up to 8 so your help to find more would be appreciated. We are also looking at the potential for having an organ scholar at St Mary's who would hugely benefit from learning to accompany the choir on our high quality organ. Getting more young people into choral music is vital if the choral tradition is going to survive and often leads to church musicians for life and they learn a great deal on the scholarship scheme – setting them up for potential further opportunities at university.

Our fledgling Junior Choir ran for 2 terms very successfully but folded as Y6 pupils wanted to focus on their new Y7 schools. However, we have just restarted the choir and hope it is able to grow and thrive.

Musical highlights of course include the carol services around Christmas and our singing of Stainer's Crucifixion on Good Friday. We continue to occasionally push to sing music that is at the edge of our capability so that we can improve as a choir over time and we sing music new to the choir regularly to develop good sight-reading skills. Our evensongs and carol services are available to listen to online if anyone wishes to do so. I'm writing this before our ambitious Passiontide offering which I hope will have been a success! Thanks again for your welcome and I look forward to writing many more of these in the coming years!

St Mary's Welcome Team – Jenny Wiseman

As I explained in last year's APCM report, there has not been a formal welcome "team" since before the Covid pandemic. I hope I'm not seeing our church community through "rosetinted glasses" but believe that we are as a church family much more aware now of newcomers and those on their own at any of our events – be they worship based or social. It is not at all uncommon for me to be introduced to new people and also to be asked if I know who someone is at a service or a social event.

Team Rector's report

Printed copy available at the meeting

The rector reported on the numerous activities that made up the life of St Mary's and St Michael's during 2022. At the beginning of the year the church was recovering from a new variant of Covid-19 but gradually 2022 marked the first time in two years in which churches and their activities were able to proceed more or less as normal. The exception being work with children and families which remains at a low level. Great efforts were made to support Ukrainians throughout the year with special thanks to hosts.

Warm spaces and support for food banks were provided in both parishes to help those in need during the cost of living crisis.

Christie and Ryan Gilfeather, the new curates, were welcomed. They have had a good start to their ministry and are due to be ordained this summer in a service at St Mary's. Rob Milner the new Director of Music has brought new energy to the role, resuming junior choir and introducing new choral scholarships.

St Michael's welcomed the partnership with the Romanian congregation.

The Queen's platinum jubilee was celebrated and there was sorrow for her death later in the year.

Mary Westley retired as Head Teacher after two decades of outstanding service.

A concern this year is the anticipated deficit of £35K due to the extraordinary rise in the costs of running the parishes. Suggestions were made as to how income might be increased to pay for those costs, supported by our excellent treasurer, Maggie.

The rector thanked all the PCC for their hard work during the year in supporting the life and work of the church, its finances and buildings,

particularly Maggie, Diane, Jackie the Stuarts and Sue, who has been a wonderful warden at

St Michael's, but has now retired.

The rector reminded the meeting that the most important ministry of all is prayer.

Beth Bates suggested putting the offertory plate out at baptism services. In response Jenny Wiseman suggested asking Linda Dobbs for her opinion of this as some baptism visitors feel awkward.

- iii) JW asked whether, after Easter, the cross could be placed behind the curtain in the chancel. It had been left out with the intention of oiling it.
- iv) SW thanked DM for the play and praise that is going strong.

The grace was said by all and the chairman closed the meeting at 21:05.
